MESSAGE FROM YOUR DCM

Dear Friends,

new year! A new month! A new day! I write with sadness but with hope. Most of you have heard that Jim Carter passed away on Christmas Day. He was and is an example of "pass it on, give it away, service work, helping another alcoholic" - what our Primary Purpose is. As he was fond of saying, the way to keep from falling off the edge is to stay in the middle - and service work will keep you in the middle.

A true leader leads by example. Although we may try to emulate a leader who we admire, we must each be our own example of leadership. I have just returned from the VAC Winter meeting, where we set the agenda and workshop topics for the Spring Assembly that will take place 3-5 April 2020, in Chesapeake, VA. And, for our DCM sharing session, the topic was leadership. In my sharing at the meeting I read those first two sentences, as I had started this message before knowing the subject of our share; I highlighted the breadth of service work

that Jim had been doing, and I said that we all need to do service work on levels we are comfortable with, maybe some that we might not be so comfortable with, and each do our part. Our service work ensures that meetings are here for the next alcoholic that walks through the door - suffering or not - and ensures that AA will be here for those yet to come that will need this spiritual program.

We have a Responsibility Statement, and we also have a Declaration of Unity: *This we owe to A.A.'s future: To place our common welfare first, To keep our Fellowship United, For on A.A. Unity depend our lives and the lives of those to come.* And our unity comes through service work.

Final responsibility and ultimate authority for A.A. world services should always reside in the collective conscience of our whole Fellowship.



AROUND THE TABLES, acceptance of our own alcoholism is sometimes talked about as though all it required was accurate clinical or experimental observation. From countless newcomers, I hear stories replete with devastating evidence of their alcoholism. Yet, after a while, some go out and try to drink "once again" in a manner that obviously has been foreign to them from the start.

Intellectually, the admission is freely and often gleefully given. But, alas, intellect alone is insufficient to rid oneself of the negative effects of alcoholism. The acceptance that is tantamount to a happy, sober life must be in the heart or the subconscious. To obtain this acceptance knowingly, one need only turn to the fifth chapter of the Big Book and use the marvelous aid given there: "(c) That God could and would if He were sought." Seeking God to help me accept my alcoholism made the path much easier for me.

In the very beginning, as I read the First Step, I could see the unmanageability of my life, but accepting alcoholism as a contributing factor was more

difficult. Yet, in a reasonably short time, things changed--because I applied good old (c) to all my affairs. Acceptance can be not only easy, but gratifying. Like so much else, it is based on going to God first and foremost in all things. Truly, (c) is the most practical method of living, stated in concise form. It is what the mystics tried to find in diverse esoteric ways. Dr. Bob said, "Keep it simple," and isn't that just what (c) is? It's simple, practical, and full of power.
